She also has designed curriculum on a wide range of business legal topics and has taught several hundred community seminars since beginning her legal career. She recently ended her tenure as the Editor-In-Chief of the American Bar Association Journal on Affordable Housing & Community Development Law. Ms. Hauber serves on the boards of several local and statewide nonprofit organizations. She is a graduate of Harvard College and received her law degree, magna cum laude, from Boston College Law School.
